LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Park Champions,

Parks are joy. Parks are play. Parks are family, community, togetherness.

It's hard to fully describe all that parks are, and the tensions they hold here in Milwaukee. Every challenge we face plays out in our parks. Individuals who are unhoused often find themselves sleeping in parks, residents utilize trails to improve their mental and physical well-being, and unwanted and unsafe activities can affect young people who play in our parks.

Parks are healing and health. Parks are "crime prevention." Parks are racial and social justice.

Conversely, live music in our parks brings neighbors to appreciate beauty together. The smell of summer grills announces family gatherings and occasions to celebrate. Rivers and lakes converge in our parks, trees stand tall to provide respite from urban life. Strong youth and family serving organizations anchor our parks, connecting Milwaukee's young people to nature, play, water, exercise and more.

Parks are mental and physical well-being. Parks are clean air and water. Parks are medicine.

Doing this work for the last two years, I've often thought of parks as a barometer for how we as a community are doing. There is a lot to celebrate and there is a lot of work still to be done. It can feel heavy day after day to hold the tension of parks. Parks both give us life, and reflect the harm caused by generations of disinvestment and systemic racism. Parks are both a space of healing and conflict.

We continue to do this work because we see the vision. How different would Milwaukee be if every park in every corner of our County, regardless of the socioeconomic makeup of the surrounding neighborhood, was buzzing with year round activity? If young people always knew they had a safe place to go and have fun in their nearby park? If our parks were consistently well maintained, accessible, state of the art, and safe, so many resident needs would be fulfilled.

For this vision to become a reality we must see true investment on all levels. We must continue to "collectively steward a thriving park system," and we must see everyone get involved in a way that is meaningful to them. At Milwaukee Parks Foundation we are building a people-centered movement for parks, rooted in equity. It's hard work, but it is full of joy and light and love.

Parks are for you and I. Parks are for all of us.

Thank you for being an important part of this work.

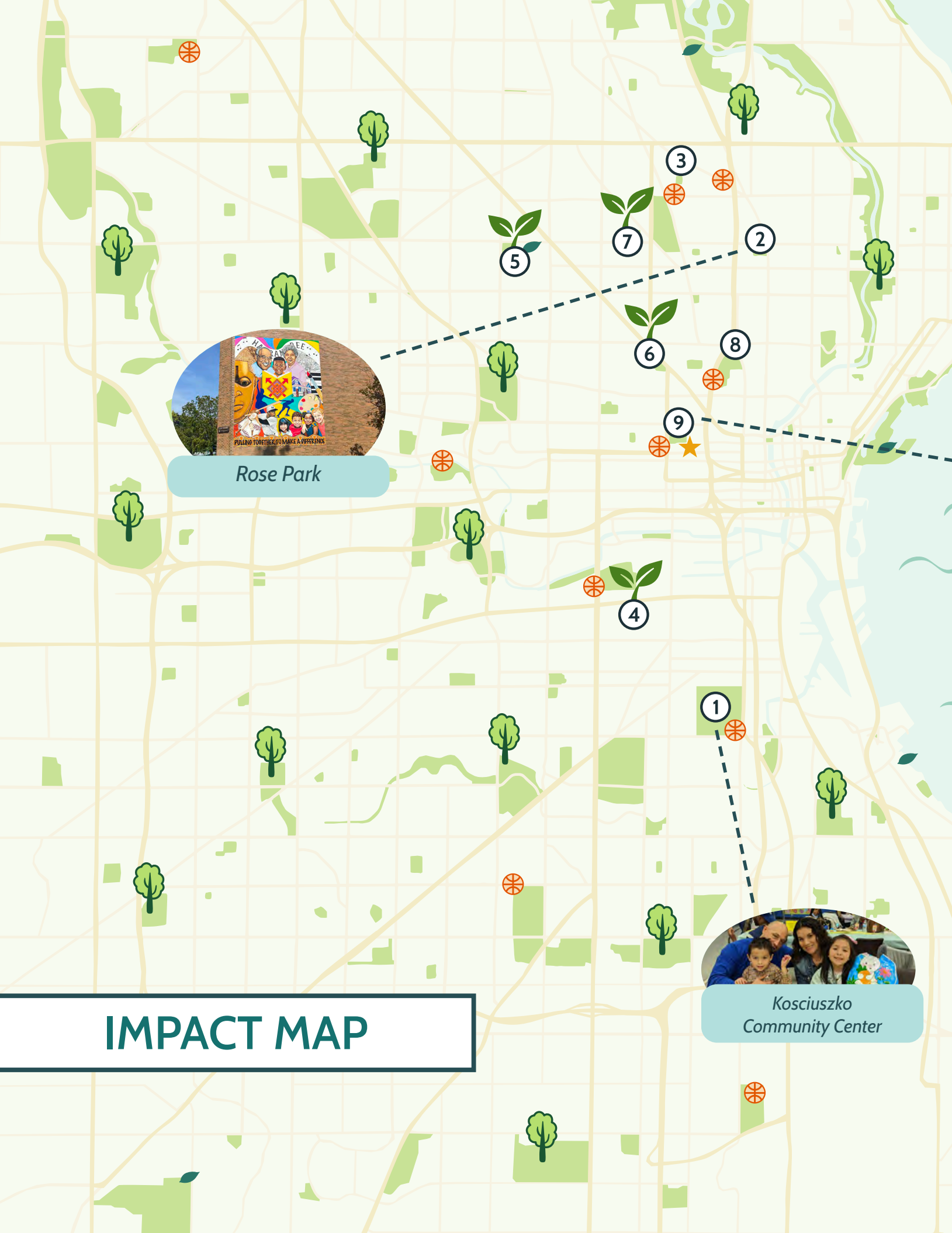

SUSTAINABLE PARK INVESTMENT



The central challenge Milwaukee Parks Foundation (MPF) continues to face is raising support for the Park System as a whole. All of us have a favorite park, a favorite playground, where we want to see investment. But it is sustainable, impactful support into the highest need parks that will change the shape of park system, our communities, and our county. This is where Seeds come in.

Through Seeds investments, MPF supports system-wide improvements with an intentional focus on parks that have the most need. In 2022 alone, more than \$500,000 was poured back into our beloved parks thanks to the generosity of many of you. Halfway through 2023, that amount is more than \$1,000,000.

By investing in system-wide solutions, MPF plants seeds that can be enjoyed for years to come. What does this look like in action?

Below are two examples of impactful investment:

Kosciuszko Community Center Fund



Milwaukee County Parks is home to two thriving community centers. The Kosciuszko Community Center and the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Community Center. In 2022 alone, these Centers saw more than 33,000 visits from neighbors. Community Center Funds donated were used to upgrade boxing rings and boxing equipment for programming, purchase additional weight room equipment, basketballs, a new pool table, and bleacher repair for a beloved indoor basketball gym.

Carver Park Baseball Diamond Renovation

Last but not least, the Beckum Stapleton Little League is one of the most thriving, longest standing little leagues on Milwaukee's northside. Thanks to the generosity of Christian Yelich and American Family Insurance, the Carver Park Baseball Diamond where they play regularly is being completely refurbished. Young people deserve the highest quality play spaces, and we are grateful this partnership can help accomplish that.

In 2022, Milwaukee Parks Foundation debuted our Sprouts strategy, seeking to invest in grassroots leaders and groups anchoring our parks. We believe the best ideas for each park won't come from outside, but rather, from those that know it best.

So with over 150 parks system-wide and too many worthy groups to choose from, where did we start? In 2020, Milwaukee County Parks created an Equity Index, which ranks parks using surrounding population and environmental statistics. In summary, the Equity Index quantifies historical disinvestment in the community surrounding each park. This data-driven approach allows us to focus our energy and resources where they are needed most, both within the Sprouts strategy and across MPF's work.

In the summer of 2022, to test our strategy, MPF launched the Sprouts Fund. Guided by thoughtful and experienced leaders on our Program Committee, we invited groups working in Atkinson, Clarke Square, Clarence and Cleopatra Johnson, Moody and Walker Square Parks. We offered grants of \$5,000 to support projects with momentum or in need of resources to get off the ground. Without exception, each group was brimming with ideas. We heard about the desire to gather and play, to care for parks and neighbors. These conversations were incalculably valuable, providing insight into the needs and challenges faced by parks groups today. We approved gifts to Clarke Square Neighborhood Initiative, Friends of Moody Park, The Table and The Village Group.

Other early examples of our Sprouts strategy in action include:

Collaboration

on community-led mural projects in Rose Park with Friends of Rose Park and Wells Fargo, as well as in Berrien Park with Milwaukee Alliance Against Racism & Political Repression, Lucille Berrien's family and True Skool.

Partnership

with local leaders like Camille Mays and organizations like Nearby Nature MKE, finding new ways to collaborate through continued exchange.

Production

of a youth writing competition themed around parks named Lyrics for Our Sanctuaries, yielding both tributes to our green spaces and insight from young creatives.

Throughout the 2022 holiday season, we were able to support their community gatherings for Halloween, Thanksgiving, and Christmas, each planned and hosted by young leaders from the Amani neighborhood.

DONOR HIGHLIGHT

Fund for Lake Michigan

Through a funding collaborative including Molson Coors and Fund for Lake Michigan, Milwaukee County Parks hired two new staff members, greatly increasing their capacity to care for our parks. The Special Projects Coordinator will lend project management support and expertise across our 150+ parks, allowing Milwaukee County Parks to implement critical improvement projects. The Reforestation Coordinator will focus on restoring tree canopy in Milwaukee's neighborhood parks. With the effects of climate change and urban heat islands harming our communities, this role is needed more than ever before.



Due to the generosity of Fund for Lake Michigan and Molson Coors, Milwaukee County Parks will see a significant increase in both the planning and execution of critical capital projects, reforestation, and wetland enhancements ultimately creating healthier communities and a thriving parks system.

In close partnership, we address long-standing challenges like crumbling infrastructure, outdated amenities, and

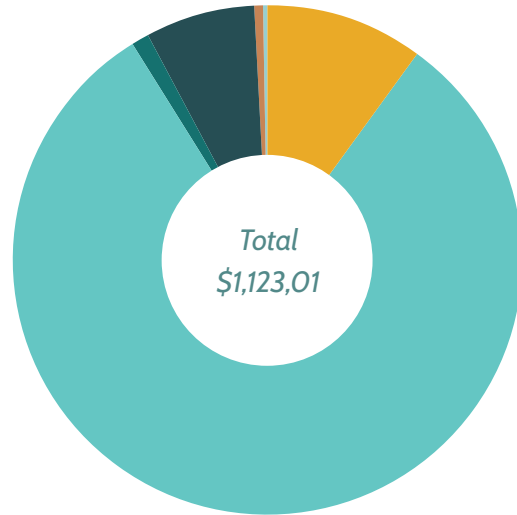

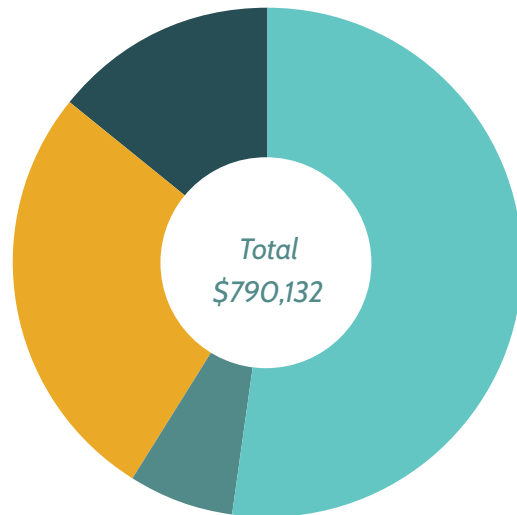
